Rules:

1. All riders will abide by the rules and regulations of the Sunderland Agricultural Fair.
2. Exhibitor Fee: All persons in this show are required to pay a $\$ 10.00$ membership fee.
3. The Show Committee and the Judge reserve the right to refuse entries, alter conditions, combine and/or cancel classes at their discretion.
4. The Judge's decision is final. Any exhibitor who is guilty of creating a disturbance whether by openly criticizing the judge or committee or using obscene language to any judge or official shall therefore forfeit the right to any premium and may be suspended by the Society from exhibiting.
5. Rain or Shine. No Refund.
6. Entry fees will only be refunded upon the presentation of a veterinarian's certificate or doctor's note presented to the show secretary.
7. Any protests must be registered to the Show Committee by the rider involved before the commencement of the class following that of the protest.
8. The Fair Board, the Horse Show Committee and any workers on the day of the show will not be held responsible for loss, damage or injury to any person, animal or property in any way involved in the show.
9. Riders' ages are taken as of January 1st of the current year. Classes are open to riders of all ages except the Leadline class.
10. All riders must wear appropriate attire. Riders in Leadline, All Beginner Classes and All Over Fences Classes and under 18 years old must wear ASTM/BSI approved hard hats with attached harness while mounted.
11. All Riders must wear a number to compete.
12. No horse/pony may be shown by more than one rider in any class.
13. Horses/ponies should be neat, cleaned and in good condition. Unhealthy, poorly conditioned or lame horses/ponies will be asked to leave the show ring.
14. Riders must leave the ring when excused or run the risk of being dismissed from the remaining classes with no refund.
15. Classes 1-12 are open to English and Western riders.
16. In Leadline, riders are to be 8 years old or under and to be lead by a person over 15 years old. These riders are eligible to enter Showmanship and Costume Class only.
17. Riders in Division A are eligible to enter Trail, Costume and Cross Rail Division (trot only).
18. Riders in Division A are not able to compete in Division B and vice versa.
19. Only two Jumper Divisions per horse and rider combination.

3. Closing date for all entries will be two weeks prior to Fair date and must be sent to the Chairperson.
4. If exhibiting more than 10 birds, entry money must be received by the Chairperson along with your entry form. Entries will not be officially accepted until the money has been received. Entry fee is $\$ .50$ per bird. Money will be non-refundable. Chairperson will contact you to confirm your entries have been received.
5. Maximum of $\mathbf{4}$ entries per section per person with a maximum of $\mathbf{5 0}$ birds will be accepted. If after closing date, room is available, the Chairperson will contact exhibitors to allow more entries.
6. Stock entered must be free from contagious infections and parasites. Unhealthy stock will be removed or refused entry. Show chairperson's decision will be final.
7. The show committee reserves the right to refuse any entry. Stock removed for health reasons will forfeit prize money.
8. Spacing is limited to 150 birds maximum ( 110 bantam spots available). It will be first come, first served basis.
9. The Committee has the right to split or create a class if there are more than 5 birds in a class.

Note: The new revised "Standard of Perfection" shall be the guide of the judge, therein, and all the birds shall be judged by comparison. Prizes will not be awarded to a bird unless it is deemed worthy of the same by the judge. The judge's decision will be final.

No person will be admitted to the hall from 11:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., except the officers in charge.
2. Entries, mailed to Box 370 Sunderland, ON, L0C 1 H 0 , must be received three business days prior to the Fair date and contain the membership number of the entrant or the $\$ 10.00$ membership fee. Any article forwarded, prepaid and addressed to the Secretary, will receive an Exhibitor's ticket which will be placed on exhibition. This is at the risk and expense, if any, of the owner.
3. All implements and livestock must be on the grounds not later than 11:00 a.m. on the second day of the show. All carriages, teams, single driving horses and drivers must be on the grounds one hour before judging that day.
4. Completed Exhibitor tickets, furnished by the Secretary, must be attached to every animal or article before being handed to the Director to be placed on exhibition.
5. No animal or article shall have on it any prize colour or cards until the awards have been made.
6. Any member may compete for any or all the prizes offered, and any person may become a member on or before Fair Day in September by paying the sum of $\$ 10.00$.
7. Children wishing to enter an Adult class must pay the entrant fee of $\$ 10.00$.
8. No person shall make more than one entry for each section of a class unless otherwise stated in the Fair Book.
9. Articles entered for competition must be the bona fide property of the person entering them.

15. All exhibitors entering livestock or machinery must show proof of Liability Insurance in the amount of $\$ 2,000,000$.
16. All persons conversing or interfering with the judges in the discharge of their duties will forfeit any right they have to a prize. The directors will use their utmost endeavour to restrain the judges from examining the animals or articles on exhibition before they proceed to their duties.
17. Admission to the Fair will be by payment at the gate, identifying ribbons, wrist bands or by membership card.
18. The hall opens to the public at $5: 30$ p.m. on the evening of the first day of the fair.
19. No article entered for competition will be allowed to be taken from the building until the close of the exhibition, which will be between 6:00 and 7:00 p.m. Wednesday, the second day of fair competition.
20. Though the directors will use every possible precaution to secure good order and safety of the articles entrusted for exhibition, they wish to have it understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting and should any article be injured or missing, the directors will do their best to recover the article but will not become responsible thereof.
21. All food booths vendors must be approved by the Society and the Public Health Department before setting up.
22. All gambling will be strictly prohibited. No stands, booths or trafficking of any goods, wares or merchandise will be allowed on the grounds or within 30 metres thereof.
23. All protests or complaints must be lodged with the Secretary in writing within one week after the close of the Fair.
24. Prize winners are requested to communicate with the Treasurer regarding any error they may discover in the list of awards before the payment of prizes. The Treasurer will retain a membership fee for next year from each exhibitor securing premiums amounting to $\$ 15.00$ or more.
25. We would appreciate that all cheques be cashed by October 31st in the year the prize was awarded.
26. In the case of bad weather or other unforeseen circumstances and receipts are not sufficient to pay prizes in full, the Directors reserve the right to settle prizes on a percentage basis
27. Discretionary premiums may be awarded for articles not on the prize lists, as recommended by the judges. The directors will determine the amount of the premium.
28. Arena Judges will commence their duties at 12:00 noon sharp, on the first day of the show.
